

The different areas of Carantec

Several areas of Carantec have for a long time been emblematic, thanks to their history and architecture.

La Chaise du Curé

Situated between the Pors Pol and Kélenn beaches, this spot offers breathtaking views over the Bay of Morlaix to the east and Callot island to the west.

It is said locally that, during World War I, the Priest of Carantec used to come here to read out loud his breviary, seated on the rock that has from that time on been called "the Priest's Chair".

Pen al Lann

At the beginning of the 19th century, Pen al Lann headland was a poor moorland, covered with gorse and surrounded by three or four farms. In the 1930s, many artists were attracted by this exceptional setting.

The harbour and the Grève Blanche beach

In Carantec there are few professional fishermen who disembark their fish on the slipway, facing the Kreisker church of Saint Pol de Léon, but many crafts, owned by locals or tourists alike make up the scenery of the harbour, the starting point for walking tours of Callot island.



The Grève Blanche is one of the fine sand beaches which helped to increase the fame of the resort at

the beginning of the century. Bordered by many villas and dotted with traditional beach huts, this is where families gather to sunbathe.
